
#### **GOAL**

In concert with the **Jobs for the Future** (the nationally-recognized umbrella organization for the Early College High School Initiative), the University of Hawaii System, the Department of Education and the State of Hawaii 55 by 25 goal, the primary goal of the Waipahu High School Early College program is to afford lower-income youth, first-generation college goers, English language learners, students of color, and other underserved populations in higher education the opportunity to simultaneously earn a high school diploma and an Associate's degree or up to two years of credit toward a Bachelor's degree; thereby strengthening a more competitive economy, reducing the 27% skills gap and reducing under-employment and unemployment for the underrepresented populations.



Fourth Annual P-20 Honor Societies Pathway to Academic Excellence

On Saturday, April 28, 2018, the Fourth Annual P-20 Honor Societies Pathway to Academic Excellence brought together all five Elementary Honor Societies, Waipahu Intermediate School National Junior Honor Society, Waipahu High School National Honor Society and Leeward Community College (LCC) Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) International Honor Society. The annual event focuses on the four hallmarks of most honor societies: 1) scholarship, 2) leadership, 3) fellowship and 4) service. This year, the Fourth Annual P-20 Honor Societies Pathway to Academic Excellence focused specifically on developing leadership skills and was enthusiastically attended by over 250 participants.

The leadership workshop was held at Waipahu High School and was co-sponsored by the DOE Waipahu Complex and the West Pearl Harbor Rotary Club.
